Auburn's Annual Veterans Day Ceremony

The City of Auburn will host its annual Veterans Day Ceremony on Thursday, November 11 at 10:00 a.m. at the Veterans Memorial located at the northeast corner of Ross Street and Glenn Avenue.

Mayor Bill Ham, Jr. will be the moderator and the Auburn High School Choral Company will sing the National Anthem and other patriotic songs. The ceremony will conclude with a memorial wreath laying. Immediately following the ceremony, a reception will be held at Greystone located at 434 E. Magnolia Avenue.

Attendees are encouraged to park at the Development Services Building and Felton Little Park. Handicapped parking will be available on Ross Street which will be closed during the ceremony. Celebrate Auburn Recycles Day

The City of Auburn will celebrate Auburn Recycles Day on November 12. The theme for this year is "RecycleAuburn: It All Comes Back To You." The Auburn Recycles Day Celebration will begin at 10:00 a.m. at the RecycleAuburn Drop Off Center, located at 365-A N. Donahue Drive. Activities include introduction of the winners of the RecycleAuburn Poster Contest from among entries submitted by junior high school students.

Auburn residents may participate in recycling by becoming involved in the curbside recycling program or by depositing material at the RecycleAuburn Drop Off Center. In addition to accepting newspaper, steel cans, plastic bottles with #1 or #2 recycling code, cardboard, and clear and



brown glass at curbside, residents may also drop off green glass, magazines, mixed paper and rechargeable and non-rechargeable batteries (no car or boat batteries) at the RecycleAuburn Drop Off Center. Your participation in Auburn's recycling program is important to the City's efforts to preserve the environment.

Council Passes Stronger Nuisance Ordinance

In September, the City Council approved an ordinance aimed at strengthening its existing nuisance abatement regulations addressing the appearance and maintenance of private property. Specifically, citations can now be issued citing individuals to appear in municipal court where the Municipal Judge will evaluate the merits of each situation and issue a ruling.

City Manager David Watkins stated, "This ordinance will allow us to step up the enforcement of nuisances, particularly in Auburn's older neighborhoods. We will be ramping up our efforts to deal with infractions. While not widespread, violations have been slowly increasing. We want to deal with the violators before they get out of hand."

Specifically, a public nuisance is defined in the ordinance as

any fence, junk, wrecked, damaged, disabled or demolished vehicle, wall, shed, deck, house, garage, building structure, or any part of any aforesaid; or any tree, pole, or any hole, pit, basement, cellar, or any part thereof, by reason of the condition in which the same is found or permitted to be or remain, shall or may endanger the health, safety, life, limb, or property, or cause any hurt, harm, inconvenience, discomfort, damage, or injury to any one or more individuals in the city, in any one or more of the following particulars:

- (1) By reason of being a menace, threat and/or hazard to the general health and safety of the community.
- (2) By reason of being a fire hazard.
- (3) By reason of being unsafe for occupancy, or use on, in, upon, about or around the aforesaid property.

Board Vacancies

Two vacancies on the **Parks & Recreation Advisory Board** were announced at the October 19 City Council meeting and will be filled at the November 16 City Council meeting. One incumbent is eligible for reappointment.

One vacancy on the **Public Park & Recreation**

Board will be announced at the November 2 City Council meeting and will be filled at the December 7 City Council meeting. The incumbent is not eligible for reappointment.



Two vacancies on the **Cemeteries Advisory Board** will be announced at the November 16 City Council meeting and will be filled at the December 21 City Council meeting. The incumbents are eligible for reappointment. Citizens interested in serving are encouraged to contact one of their

City Council members or notify the City Manager's Office.



(4) By reason of lack of sufficient or adequate maintenance of the property, and/or being vacant, any of which depreciates the enjoyment and use of property in the immediate vicinity to such an extent that it is harmful to the community in which such property is situated or such condition exists.

Citizens can report alleged violations for litter, weeds, or unkempt properties to the Planning Department at 501-3040. Issues dealing with building structures should be reported to the Department of Public Safety at 501-3170. Copies of Ordinance 2242 are available in the City Manager's office. Special Tips for Walkers

In the Fall, many citizens enjoy walking as a form of exercise. If you enjoy walking, keep the following tips in mind:

- If one is available, walk on a sidewalk to be a safe distance from automobile traffic.
- Always walk on your left and face oncoming traffic.
- Wear reflective clothing between the waist and shoulders on the front and back from one-half hour before sunset until one-half hour before sunrise to help drivers identify the presence of a pedestrian. This is a City ordinance.
- Walk with a friend, especially early in the morning and in the evening. If you have to walk alone, call someone and tell them where you are going and when you will be back.
- Vary your schedule or your route.
- Be sure to wait at an intersection for the "walk" signal at a crosswalk.

By working together, we can improve the safety of our community.
