City Receives High Marks in 2011 Citizen Survey

City services are a thread woven throughout the fabric of a community, with citizen feedback one of the most valuable assets a City government can receive in creating a quality community patchwork. Feedback received each year in Auburn's annual Citizen Survey emphasizes areas of progress along with areas in need of improvement. The survey results enable City officials to hear a collective voice from Auburn citizens and to stay connected with those they serve.

Citizen satisfaction with the state of City services measures very highly in the 2011 survey. The overall City services with which residents were most satisfied were: the quality of the City's library facilities (90%), the quality of the City's school system (89%), police, fire, and ambulance services (88%) and parks and recreation programs and facilities (82%). Citizen satisfaction increased significantly in 27 areas including the quality of the City's leadership (+9%) and the transparency of City government (+6%). Satisfaction with the City's crime prevention efforts, street maintenance and curbside recycling services increased by 5% in each area.

Perhaps the most significant gauge of citizen satisfaction can be found in how citizens view the quality of life in the community. This year, an overwhelming majority of citizens (91%) said they are satisfied with the quality of life provided in Auburn. Citizens delivered a tremendous vote of confidence in local government by ranking their satisfaction with the overall value received for City tax dollars and fees at 78%, up 4% from last year and 33% above the national average.

While overall citizen satisfaction is high, there are areas in which citizens would like to see continued emphasis from the City. Much like last year, residents would like to see attention directed to the following areas: 1) flow of traffic congestion management (56% satisfaction), 2) the maintenance of city streets and facilities (70% satisfaction) and 3) quality of the school system (89% satisfaction).

Employees in Auburn's Public Works Department have heard the call and have embraced the challenge to improve traffic flow and maintenance of city streets, implementing a number of improvement projects since the last survey:

- Traffic signals were added at intersections of North College Street Shelton Mill Road and East Glenn Av-
- The timing of traffic signals at intersections around Village Mall were coordinated to improve traffic flow
- A project to add illuminated street signs to several downtown intersections is underway
- A left turn lane, an additional thru lane, and a right turn lane were added at the intersection of Shelton Mill Road and East University Drive
- A left turn lane was added to all four sides of the intersection of East University Drive – South Donahue Drive
- Construction began on the Interstate-85 Exit 51 interchange with the Alabama Department of Transportation constructing the exit
- After more than a year of construction and improvements, the new bridge on North Donahue Drive will re-open in June.

Education remains a top priority among City leaders as Auburn prides itself on maintaining quality learning opportunities in both primary and secondary education. Auburn City Schools have been ranked among the best in the country over the years. This past year was no exception as Newsweek Magazine ranked Auburn High School in its Top 400 public high schools in the nation. On the state level, the school system was ranked 2nd and became home to the 2010-2011 State Teacher of the Year, Phil Rodney Wilson. City officials continue to support Auburn schools, annually allocating \$7 million of the City's General Fund Budget to Auburn City Schools. City officials are working closely with the School Board to find the best way to address the growing student population and facility needs.

City employees are dedicated to providing excellent customer service. This year's citizen survey reports that 81% of residents who contacted the City during the past year felt the department they contacted was responsive to their issue. While customer service was positive overall (22% above the national average), there is room for improvement and City staff will continue to strive to bring customer service ratings in all areas closer to 100%.

Mayor Bill Ham, Jr. commented on the survey results by saying "Council priorities are guided by our residents through this survey. We're fortunate to have highly professional employees working daily with citizen satisfaction in mind. We'll continue to listen as citizens tell us what they think makes Auburn a great place to live, work and raise children."

While the Citizen Survey conveys a variety of messages to City staff, we hope it communicates an underlying message to our citizens as well. The message: we want to hear from you. The City's ability to adapt and change in a positive direction is only as strong as the feedback received from its citizens. Thank you to all of Auburn's citizens who participated in this year's Citizen Survey.

The 2011 Citizen Survey was conducted by the ETC Institute, a research firm hired by the City of Auburn. ETC Institute mailed a seven-page survey to a random sample of 1,500 households within the City of Auburn. Approximately seven days after the surveys were mailed, residents who received the survey were contacted by phone. Of the households that received a survey, 277 completed the survey by phone and 353 returned it by mail for a total of 630 completed surveys (42% response rate). Hartsfield received his commission through the Auburn University Reserve Officer Training School and entered the U. S. Air Force in 1955. Later, Hartsfield became a NASA astronaut in September 1969. He retired from the United States Air force in 1977, and continued to work for NASA in a civilian capacity for the next 21 years.

Immediately following the breakfast, at 10 a.m., the City of Auburn will hold a memorial wreath laying ceremony at the Auburn Veterans Memorial Monument, located at the northeast corner of Ross Street and Glenn Avenue. Ceremony attendees are encouraged to park at the Douglas J. Watson Municipal Complex and Felton Little Park. During the ceremony, Ross Street will be closed from Glenn Avenue to Harper Avenue to allow for parking for the disabled.

City Grants Trash Amnesty May 2-6

Spring cleaning is just around the corner. The Auburn City Council has approved the City's 7th Annual Trash Amnesty Week for the week of May 2-6, 2011. During Trash Amnesty Week, the fees normally assessed to residents for the collection of oversized yard debris and other bulky waste will be waived. Citizens are asked to pay close attention to the following guidelines when placing items out for collection:

- Debris should be placed at the curb no later than 6:00 a.m. on your regularly scheduled collection day. Please avoid placing items on or near mailboxes, utility poles, or other fixed objects. All items should be properly contained or bundled so they do not fall into the street or down storm drains.
- The City will accept yard waste, appliances, and bulky items for collection. No household garbage, hazardous waste, or other unacceptable waste should be placed out for collection with debris.
- Debris should not be placed in the roadway, on or around storm drains, near utility lines, on utility boxes, or on vacant lots.
- Limbs and other debris should be no longer than 5 feet in length.
- To facilitate wood debris and metal recycling efforts, please separate all wood debris, including limbs and grass clippings from metal items.

Due to the large volume of debris expected during Trash Amnesty Week, citizens may experience a delay in the collection schedule. Every reasonable effort will be made to maintain the regular collection schedule.

Travel With Care

The City of Auburn and Auburn University are partnering to present a safety and alternative transportation campaign entitled "Travel With Care" this Spring. The awareness campaign targets all modes of transportation. It is aimed at increasing awareness about pedestrian safety; such as important points for use of crosswalks, pedestrian crossing signals, and reflective materials for nighttime visibility.

Drivers and pedestrians must be alert when approaching crosswalks. Research suggests that pedestrians may have a false sense of security at marked crosswalks. Because of this, they sometimes step out into the crosswalk without looking for cars first. Never step off the curb in front of a moving vehicle. The rule of thumb is to look left, then right, then left again before you enter the crosswalk. As you're crossing, don't forget to check over your shoulder for turning vehicles. Contrary to popular belief, pedestrians do NOT have the right-of-way at a crosswalk; they only have the right-of-way if they are already within the crosswalk.

Studies show that pedestrians walking in dark colored clothing at night are first seen approximately 55 feet away, giving the driver trav-

eling at 25 mph less than one second to react. A driver traveling at 25 mph needs over 150 feet to stop safely. The law requires that you wear reflective materials or lights when walking or riding at night or early morning when it is dark. City of Auburn Storm Drain **Marking Project**

As a part of its ongoing education and outreach initiatives, the City of Auburn's Water Resource Management Department (WRM) encourages citizens to participate in its Storm Drain Marking Project. This project involves the placement of watershed-specific markers on stormwater inlets throughout the City. These markers educate citizens about the connection our storm sewer system has with the surrounding water bodies and emphasizes the importance of stormwater management. Citizens can participate in one of two ways; 1) organize installation of markers with assistance from WRM staff or 2) request Storm Drain Marker Kits and install them at your convenience.
