2012 Citizen Survey

At each City Council meeting the Auburn City Council acts on an agenda representing the City's current projects and priorities as a step in realizing a larger plan reflecting the broader priorities of the City Council and the citizens they serve. Citizen input comes in a variety of ways, with citizens sometimes visiting City Hall, or attending public meetings to make their voices heard. We welcome feedback which is why the City also goes to the citizens for input through the Annual Citizen Survey.

Participating in the Annual Citizen Survey is one of the most important ways to influence the local public policy agenda. The citizen survey helps City officials identify areas where things are going well, and the areas in which improvement is needed, helps City officials plan for the future, and is carefully considered when establishing the City's budget and project priorities. In fact, the 2012 survey kicks off a new budget season, as the City's budget for fiscal years 2013 and 2014 will be formulated in the months following this year's survey.

The validity and reliability of survey results are crucial. By conducting a scientifically valid poll, the City not only gets an opportunity to hear how individual citizens feel, but to gauge the priorities and concerns of residents in general. Toward this end, the City contracts with the ETC Institute, a research firm specializing in community-based market research. ETC analyzes the survey results, measuring citizen satisfaction in each of the City's service areas as well as the relative importance of each service area to residents, helping City officials target the most important areas for improvement. The survey also includes a number of questions asked of other cities surveyed by ETC, allowing the opportunity to compare satisfaction levels within the City of Auburn to other communities around the nation. To achieve scientific validity, the ETC Institute follows strict survey procedures. The City of Auburn's survey has a minimum of a 95% level of confidence with a precision of at least +/- 3.9%.

A statistically valid random sample of residents will receive the surveys during the second week of February. If you receive a survey, please take a few moments to fill it out, and return it in the postage-paid envelope. If you're unable to return the survey by mail you will receive a telephone follow-up to provide an alternate way to participate. Your participation is vital and your individual answers are kept strictly confidential. The results are reported in aggregate. If you receive a citizen survey, please don't pass up this opportunity to communicate your priorities to your City government.



Free Fitness in the New Year

If your New Year's resolution includes plans to increase your overall health and wellness, let Auburn Parks and Recreation help you with several FREE fitness options for individuals and families.

- Auburn Stride Walkers The Auburn Stride Walkers meet every Monday, Wednesday, and Friday at 10 a.m. January -March and 9 a.m. April - December (no walks in August or on rainy days). The group explores various City walking trails at an individual's own pace and distance. Walkers meet at Kiesel Park for the first walk of each month. Monthly schedules are posted online at www.auburnalabama.org/parks. This program is open to all ages and is free to Auburn Citizens.
- Frank Brown Recreation Center Fitness Room The Frank Brown Recreation Center features a weight and cardio room for citizens ages 16 and older to use free of charge. Equipment includes stationary bikes, free weights, treadmills, exercise balls, and weights. The Fitness Room is open during regular hours, Monday - Thursday from 6 a.m. - 9 p.m., Friday from 6 a.m. - 6 p.m., Saturday from 8 a.m. - noon, and Sunday from 1 - 6 p.m. Citizens may simply sign in at the front desk and show a current photo ID.
- Kiwanis Fitness Trail at Town Creek Park The Auburn Kiwanis Club sponsors the Kiwanis Fitness Trail at Town Creek Park. Located opposite of the pavilion overlooking the pond, the Fitness Trail features several pieces of resistance-style exercise equipment available for citizens 13 and older.

The Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting has been presented to the City of Auburn for its Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2010. The Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada (GFOA) presented the prestigious national award to the City. The award represents the highest recognition for excellence in state and local government financial reporting.

This year marks the 24th consecutive year that the City of Auburn has received the GFOA CAFR Award. In order to earn the CAFR Certificate of Achievement, a government unit must publish an easily readable and efficiently organized comprehensive annual financial report, whose contents conform to program standards. The report must satisfy both generally accepted accounting principles and applicable legal requirements.

This award further validates Auburn's commitment to excellence and transparency in government financial reporting.

City Works To Restore Streets and Neighborhoods After Tornado

When an EF-1 tornado touched down in Auburn on Wednesday, November 16, the community was fortunate that there were no serious injuries or lives lost. The 110 mile per hour winds toppled trees and damaged homes, but didn't bring with them the same widespread devastation seen all too recently in other Alabama communities. Once the storm ended, emergency responders and City crews went straight to work restoring order to a path of destruction 33 miles long and up to 700 yards wide across East Alabama.

With the National Weather Service reporting only 1 injury in Alabama, the biggest impact of the storm in Auburn was to residents whose homes sustained an estimated \$4.2 million in damage. The response mobilized almost every City department, with Public Safety evaluating and responding to immediate needs on the ground, and Environmental Services, Public Works and Parks and Recreation leading the cleanup of debris. As this article goes to print, Public Works crews have moved approximately 7,500 cubic yards of debris, including more than 700 trees, to a site where the debris will be ground and potentially recycled into biofuel. By mid-December, Environmental Service crews were back to a normal curbside pickup schedule, even as debris continues to be placed at the curb into January. At the December 6th Council meeting, the Auburn City Council thanked City crews for their tireless efforts after the storm.
