The City of Auburn Sets the Standard Nationally

"The City of Auburn is setting the standard nationally," said ETC Vice President Chris Tatham as he revealed the 2012 Citizen Survey results to the Auburn City Council in April. It's a bold statement, but Tatham brought the numbers to back it up.

Overall, Auburn citizens ranked the City of Auburn above the national average in 53 measures, exceeding it by double digits in 30 of those measures. Tatham said that overall "customer satisfaction" in Auburn has increased 10 points since 2006, while the same composite score for cities nationally decreased 5 points in the same time frame. He also reported that satisfaction with the value received for taxes and for the overall quality of City services both exceeded



the national average by 27 points. "When it comes to perceptions of the City, the two most important questions on the survey in my opinion, when I assess the strategic health of the community, are the overall quality of City services and the value that residents get for their local tax dollars," Tatham said. "What amazed me is that you rated both 27 points above the national average ... it really shows the confidence of residents in your ability to invest their resources in the places they think are important."

In addition to showing how Auburn stacks up against other cities, the Annual Citizen Survey paints a picture of how the community as a whole feels about Auburn's direction. Auburn citizens continue to identify Auburn as an education community. 93% of residents are satisfied with the local school system, up from 85% in 2005, and the highest measure since 2004. The survey shows that Auburn residents feel safe, with 91% reporting that they feel safe in Auburn and 96% reporting they feel safe in their neighborhoods. The survey indicates that residents feel positive about their community, with 95% satisfied with Auburn as a place to raise children, 94% satisfied with Auburn as a place to live and 90% satisfied with the overall image of the community. The survey salso confirms that residents are satisfied with City services, with 84% satisfied with the overall quality of City services, 80% satisfied with the City's customer service, 90% satisfied with residential garbage collection and 91% satisfied with Police, Fire and ambulance services. Tatham also pointed out that dissatisfaction levels were extremely low. Where 72% of respondents indicated that they were "satisfied" or "very satisfied" with the value of their tax dollars, only 7% were "dissatisfied," or "very dissatisfied."

Residents provided further guidance to City leaders in the survey by indicating that traffic flow, street maintenance and Auburn City Schools should continue to be high priorities. Residents also showed an interest in increased downtown parking and improved community recreation centers. Projects that address these concerns will include several major road projects already scheduled for 2012, as well as upcoming projects to improve downtown parking, construct an addition to the Frank Brown Recreation Center and build a new Senior Center.

The ETC Institute, an independent market research firm that has performed surveys for more than 500 cities in 48 states, has conducted Auburn's annual citizen survey since 2004. Auburn City officials will be further analyzing survey results in the coming weeks to help determine the City's budget and service priorities for the next biennial budget. Industries Plant Roots in Auburn

This spring began with several major industry announcements, with the City's Economic Development Department announcing a new local industry, as well as the expansion of two others, bringing additional jobs to the Auburn community. Auburn industries added more than 100 jobs each quarter during 2011. Two of Auburn's largest investments, GE Aviation and SiO2, are expected to add more than 600 jobs alone during the next few years.

In March, HONAM Petrochemical Corporation held a grand opening for its manufacturing facility in Auburn where it will produce resin materials. The company's first U.S. manufacturing operation was formed under the name of HPM Alabama Corporation and occupies an existing facility at 765 West Veterans Boulevard in the Auburn Technology Park North. "While our initial investment here in Auburn is relatively small, HPM Alabama Corporation is very important for the Lotte Group," said Honam Petrochemical President Soo Young Huh. HPM Alabama Corporation has initially invested an estimated \$9.25 million dollars with the creation of 30 jobs, and will also collaborate with Auburn University for research and development projects.

SiO2 Medical Products also made a major announcement in March and held a groundbreaking ceremony in April for a \$90 million facility which is currently underway at Auburn Technology Park West. SiO2 Medical Products will supply the medical industry with innovative products for the biological drugs industry. SiO2 is expected to bring 300 high-paying jobs to Auburn as it revolutionizes the medical field with its products and related processes which are protected by 37 patents worldwide. "It is a very special product and a product that's very much needed in the medical field," said Governor Robert Bentley. "This is a prime example of what we're trying to do in Alabama which is to create and announce good high-paying future jobs for this state" Bentley added.



In April, Seung Chang Airtek, Inc. (SCA) held an opening ceremony for the SCA Automotive Foam Plant located in the Auburn Industrial Park and announced that it will continue its commitment to Auburn by introducing another product family made up of vibration and noise dampening materials for the automotive industry. "This is an important day for the Seung Chang Airtek corporation. We started our business in Auburn in 2004 and this is another important milestone in our ability to serve our customers in North America," said Man Hong Park, CEO of the South Korean-based Seung Chang Airtek. The new plant has already employed 30 employees thus far.

City Begins Process to Renew Opelika Road

On Tuesday, April 17, 2012, the Auburn City Council approved a professional services agreement with Design Workshop, Inc. to provide professional planning, corridor design, and public meeting facilitation services for the Renew Opelika Road project.

As one of the City's most important commercial corridors, Opelika Road was identified as a prime candidate for reinvestment in the recently adopted CompPlan 2030. Renew Opelika Road is intended to help revitalize and redevelop the area by encouraging new investment and reinvestment to enhance the visual environment, improve building utilization and lot configurations, fill vacancies and improve traffic flow and pedestrian accessibility. Renew Opelika Road will help maintain and grow the corridor as a vibrant, beautiful and economically-productive area.

The planning process will include an extensive process of public engagement through public design meetings, one-on-one interviews, and online opportunities for input. Utilizing public input and analysis of existing physical and economic conditions, Design Workshop, Inc. will draft a plan that addresses land use, building and site design, architecture, transportation, streetscapes, and recommendations for implementation and future funding. The development of the plan will take place under the guidance of a project steering committee made up of members of the City Council and Planning Commission, property and business owners, and city staff. Initial meetings for the general public are projected to be held in June.

Keeping Fire Hydrants Visible

The Auburn Fire Division and Auburn Water Works Board need your help keeping the area around fire hydrants clear. Auburn Fire Division relies on accessible fire hydrants for an emergency water supply. Accessing hydrants in an emergency is critical and can make the difference when it comes to protecting life and property.

The City of Auburn requires 3-feet of clear space around fire hydrants, most of which are located in the right-of-way. The hydrant should be visible and accessible from all approaches. Items such as shrubs, brush, tree limbs, posts, fences, vehicles, trash, storage or any other materials should not be placed near fire hydrants.



Drought Conditions Persist

The Auburn area has experienced below normal rainfall and varying levels of drought continuously since July of 2010. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor drought conditions are currently "extreme" in the Auburn area. The drought is projected to persist and possibly intensify during the upcoming summer growing season, creating an increased water demand for irrigation. During the drought last summer, water usage in Auburn increased by 30 percent over the previous year. Residents are encouraged to use water efficiently to help avoid water restrictions as drought conditions continue.
