Citizens Rate Auburn at an All-Time High

The results of the 2014 Citizen Survey were presented to the Auburn City Council at the Tuesday, May 20th Council meeting, with residents giving high marks to City leadership, City services, Auburn City Schools and the value received for their tax dollars.

"Results this year are among the best they've ever been," said Chris Tatham, President of the ETC Institute, a Kansas based research firm. "Overall satisfaction with city services is at an all-time high."

Tatham began the presentation by summarizing the results of this year's survey with five major findings:

- Residents have a very positive perception of the City
- The City of Auburn is moving in the right direction
- The City of Auburn is equitably serving the needs of residents in all areas of the City
- Auburn is setting the standard for the delivery of City services, with satisfaction measures among the highest nationally

 Residents are more satisfied with local traffic flow and infrastructure, with further improvements no longer rated a "very high" priority.

Quality and Direction

Ninety-two percent (92%) of residents ranked the overall quality of life in the City as "good" or "excellent," with 96% ranking Auburn as a "good" or "excellent" place to live. Tatham remarked that the ranking for Auburn as a place to work (82% good or excellent - 22 points above the national average) "suggests that you'll continue to thrive economically in the years ahead."

Eighty-six percent (86%) of residents gave positive ratings to City services, an all-time high for that measure. "One in three give you a five on a five-point scale and only 2% give you negative ratings. So for every person that doesn't like what you're doing, there are 43 out there that actually feel pretty good about the City's progress," said Tatham.

The ranking for value received for tax dollars and fees tells a similar story. "Only 5% of residents gave negative ratings, yet 76% gave positive ratings and you are at the national high," Tatham said. "Of hundreds of communities in our database, you are giving the most value to your residents."

Since 2006, the City's rankings have significantly improved in 53 areas measured, with no statistically significant decreases in the same time frame. "A number of areas, over half, have improved by 10% or more." Similarly, since 2013, ratings significantly improved in 51 areas, with only two statistically significant decreases.

Auburn rated above the national average in 58 of 60 areas, with 49 areas significantly above the national average, and 42 areas beating the national average by 10 points or more. "You're now clearly setting the standard in a number of areas," said Tatham.

Traffic and Infrastructure

According to Tatham, one of the most notable outcomes of this year's survey is the satisfaction level with local traffic flow and city infrastructure. This is the first of the 11 citizen surveys conducted by ETC in which residents' overall satisfaction with traffic flow has resulted in further improvement being ranked a "high" priority, instead of a "very high" priority. Similarly, the priority level of infrastructure

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improvements dropped to "medium." "Two of your biggest issues have seen gradual improvement over many years, and I think that's one reason residents feel so good about the direction in which the City is heading" said Tatham.

Rankings for traffic flow have increased from 43% positive in 2006, which was significantly below the national average, to 63% positive this year, now significantly above the national average. Similarly, city infrastructure has improved from 60% positive in 2006 to 75% positive this year. "This is also the first year you have more people giving you a rating of 5 for traffic flow, which means very satisfied, vs. [people who give you a rating of] dissatisfied, so the investments you've made over many years have clearly paid off."

Leadership

Residents' rank the effectiveness of the City Manager at 71% positive, compared to the national average of 55%. Elected officials are also ranked positively by 68% of residents, 12 points above the national average. Residents also rank the effectiveness of appointed boards and commissions at 12 points above the national average. Satisfaction with the level of public involvement in decision-making comes in at 7 points above the national average.

"There's only a handful of cities that I work with that I really get excited about their survey results because I see that they're actually using it over time. It's clearly evident in the data that you're making decisions based on what residents needs are," said Tatham.

Survey

This year marks the City of Auburn's 29th consecutive annual survey and the 11th administered by the ETC Institute. The results give city leaders a scientifically valid measure of the priorities of the community as a whole, and are used in the formulation of budget and project priorities.

Outstanding Planning Award

The City of Auburn Planning Department received the "2014 Outstanding Planning Award for a Plan or Planning Program" for the "Renew Opelika Road" plan at the American Planning Association - Alabama Chapter's (ALAPA) 2014 awards luncheon on Friday, May 16th in Prattville, Alabama.

During the CompPlan 2030 process, the Opelika Road area was identified as one of the City's most important commercial corridors and a prime candidate for revitalization and reinvestment. The resulting initiative, "Renew Opelika Road," was unanimously passed by the Auburn City Council and is now in the implementation stage. Both plans were characterized by significant public and stakeholder input as they developed.

According to ALAPA, criteria for the Outstanding Plan-

ning Award includes innovation, comprehensiveness, public participation and transferability as a plan that could be adapted for use by other cities.
