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

Your Guide to the New Toomer's Corner Intersection

The fences are down and traffic is once more flowing through the Toomer's Corner intersection. Things are almost back to normal in the heart of downtown Auburn. It's all familiar. But it's also all new.

Once again, there are Auburn Oaks on the campus corner. New trees arrived in February with a crowd gathered to watch as they were planted. In a small setback, the tree on Magnolia Avenue struggled to become established, and ultimately was replaced with a new, healthy tree in July. The new Auburn Oaks will spend their freshman year getting acclimated to their new home on the plains. Until then, Auburn University asks that we refrain from rolling the trees until the 2017 football season.

Over the summer, Auburn University continued renovations affecting campus from the Corner all the way to Samford Hall. As this issue of Open Line is being written, there is still construction scaffolding around Samford Hall as necessary building maintenance finishes on Auburn University's most recognizable landmark.

Meanwhile, residents are rediscovering the City's most iconic corner. Many factors led to the new look and feel downtown. When the Auburn Oaks were removed, Auburn University began working on plans to recreate that area of campus to accommodate new trees. With years of Toomer's Corner celebrations in the books, AU had some ideas on how to improve their corner. Similarly, the City of Auburn has been analyzing downtown events and parking and listening to related

public input for years. The results of those studies and related planning efforts led us to recent downtown parking and alleyway improvements. Intensive public input during the Downtown Master Plan process included comment and design suggestions to improve this vital area where town meets gown.

Important in the decision making process was the fact that there was aging water and sewer infrastructure under the Corner, under downtown sidewalks and under the parking area behind downtown businesses that needed to be replaced or improved. Downtown parking areas and sidewalks were old enough that they weren't built to ADA accessibility specifications. And it was evident to anyone who saw our downtown alleyways that they needed serious help. By using in-house expertise to design the elements and by addressing all of these issues in tandem, they were

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achieved in a more affordable and efficient way.

The Corner Intersection

The most obvious difference downtown is the intersection itself. Brick pavers have replaced asphalt with the entire intersection elevated so that it is even with the curb. The end result is an open plaza for downtown celebrations and events without the curbs and fencing that previously presented obstacles and trip hazards.

Wider sidewalks near the intersection allow for seat walls for downtown visitors to stop, rest and enjoy downtown. New LED lighting on light poles, under seat walls and along the curbs can be used to add a splash of color to add to the atmosphere of game day celebrations and community events. Crosswalks are now consistent with the look and feel of crosswalks along Magnolia Avenue and the renovated areas of Opelika Road, as well as complementing the campus corner.

"It's all about a sense of place," said Auburn's Assistant City Manager Kevin Cowper. "We wanted to make sure that downtown Auburn provided the sense of place that Auburn deserves, especially at this iconic location. We wanted residents and visitors alike to have a sense of arrival when they reach a place that reflects the unique history and traditions of downtown Auburn."

The Tiger Paw

According to Jeremy Henderson at The War Eagle Reader (thewareaglereader.com), the origin of the Tiger Paw at Toomer's Corner goes back to 1989, when the Auburn University Student Government Association (SGA) Spirit Committee took it upon themselves to give Toomer's Corner its very own Tiger Paw. After a brief encounter with law enforcement, City government and ALDOT, the SGA committee found that the Tiger Paw was officially sanctioned and supported by all parties by the next year and has been an Auburn landmark and tradition ever since.

But gone is the need for the SGA to gather in the Corner once or twice a year with paint rollers and leaf blowers to renew the Tiger Paw. Now, the paw is part of the corner, built into the brick paver structure of the intersection.

Some have asked us why the paw is color matched to the crosswalks instead of being an AU orange. Our project designers worked carefully with the manufacturers of the brick pavers to try to find orange pavers that would work, but found that none of the orange bricks available matched Auburn orange. Darker or more reddish oranges didn't work well in contrast to the red bricks surrounding the paw. The AU symbol previously painted into the tiger paw posed another logistical challenge for a physical version of the paw. Ultimately, the design team kept things basic, matching the paw to the crosswalks, keeping with the color scheme of the Corner intersection and campus corner, and making permanent the 26 year old Auburn tradition of a Tiger Paw in the Corner intersection.
