Learn & engage at Auburn's first Neighborhood Conference



You're invited to a new event geared toward neighborhood groups and all residents interested in the quality of life in Auburn's neighborhoods — the 2021 City of Auburn Neighborhood Conference.

The Neighborhood Conference is a free event that will take place on Saturday, Aug. 21, from 8 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. at the Harris Center and Frank Brown Recreation Center. It will include work sessions and a keynote speech along with opportunities to meet fellow neighbors who work to make Auburn safer, friendlier and lovelier every day.

The conference will begin with City Manager Megan McGowen Crouch who will speak on Auburn's council-manager form of government and how to be an informed and engaged citizen.

Each participant will have the opportunity to attend three work sessions during the conference. Preregistration is required to attend, and attendees will select their work sessions during the signup

process. Registration is FREE and will be open July 6-Aug. 10. Space is limited.

The work sessions will provide valuable information about City services and resources for neighborhoods. They will tackle topics like neighborhood safety and neighborhood engagement as well as information and tips from different City departments on things like water quality, recycling and property maintenance. "For our first year hosting this event, we wanted to bring work sessions to the public that were designed with our neighborhoods in mind. The sessions will provide information to help neighborhoods understand a little more about what certain departments do and how we can work together for a better Auburn," said Allison Blankenship, neighborhood specialist and event coordinator.

A keynote speech will conclude the Neighborhood Conference. Through storytelling and practical tips, City of Auburn Human Resources Director Kristen Reeder and Our House Director Rene Waldrop will speak on the value of being a good neighbor and how everyone has the ability to make a difference in their community. Twenty years ago, City Hall opened for business at its new location on the corner of Tichenor Avenue and Gay Street. While it was the new hub of local government in Auburn, the brick, starved-classical style building in the heart of Auburn was far from

In 1931, the City of Auburn donated the land to become the home of a larger post office. The building was constructed with a \$90,000 grant from Congress, and the post office opened its doors in 1933 under the leadership of postmaster Levi A. Knapp. The building was officially listed in the National Register of Historic Places in 1983.

The building served as the post office until 1991 when the post office moved to its current location on Opelika Road. The City bought the building back in 1992 and partnered with the Food Bank of East Alabama to use the building until October 1997 when the Food Bank moved to

Despite renovations over the years, many of the building's historic elements are still present. The Spanish clay tile roof sits over the large arches that mark the entrance. Once you step inside, you'll see the same natural mahogany wainscoting with decorative trim lining the front portion of the lobby. The mahogany flows into the front stairway leading to the basement, which also has a Compania Light Rose Tennessee marble wainscoting. And the old mahogany postmaster

The decision to bring City Hall downtown from its former location at the corner of Ross Street and Glenn Avenue — now the Development Services Building — reflected the importance the City placed on supporting and developing a vibrant downtown at the turn of the century. Since then, downtown has seen widespread redevelopment and development, transforming it into a thriving hub of commercial activity and a place for the community to gather for events, celebrations or just an evening out.

SAVING WATER THIS SUMMER

The Water Works Board of the City of Auburn recommends that customers follow efficient practices for irrigation and outdoor The Boykin Community Center now has watering. Try the tips below to help you conserve water, ensuring hat our water resources are used wiselv:

- Don't overwater your lawn. Generally, lawns only need watering every five to seven days during the summer. Watering your grass too frequently can make the root system of your lawn too shallow.
- · Don't water sidewalks, driveways or other paved areas. Position sprinklers so that all water lands on your lawn or plants.
- Avoid watering during the middle of the day to avoid unnecessary water loss because of evaporation. Irrigating in the middle of the day can result in losing as much as 40-60% of the water to evaporation. Water before 8 a.m. As a general rule, the earlier, the better!
- Check irrigation systems on a regular basis to ensure the system's parts (pipes, sprinkler heads, etc.) are not damaged or broken. Many irrigation systems use about 1.000 gallons of water an hour!
- Install rain sensors and/or moisture sensors on irrigation systems to eliminate unnecessary watering during rainy periods.
- · Don't leave sprinklers or hoses unattended. Use a timer to remind you to turn the water off.
- Use xeriscaping, or landscaping and horticultural practices that minimize water usage. Get more info about xeriscaping from the Alabama Cooperative Extension Service's website, aces.edu.
- · Consider rainwater harvesting. Consider collecting rain using rain barrels, etc. that can be used for outdoor watering. Note that rain barrels can collect pollutants and bacteria from roofs, animals, etc. This should be considered when using rain barrels for edible plants. Water from rain barrels should never be used for human consumption. Find more info at adem.alabama.gov/programs/water/waterforms/LIDHandbook.pdf.
- Increase your lawn mower blade height. A higher-cut lawn will encourage deeper-growing roots and will result in better soil moisture
- Mulch effectively around all plants, trees and shrubs. Mulching helps soil retain moisture and controls weeds.

The micro library features a browsing shelf with a variety of titles that rotate regularly and a bin to return library items. You can also put items on hold for pickup via phone, email or the library's online catalog.
