In October, 8,362 Auburn residents turned out to choose their next representatives on the Auburn City Council in the 2018 Municipal Runoff Election. Ron Anders, Jr. was sworn in as Auburn's new mayor on Nov. 5 along with eight other elected council members, two of which were incumbents. Renew your business license by February

Any business providing services or selling goods within Auburn city limits, including a home-based business, is required to have a City of Auburn business license. City business licenses for 2018 expire on Dec. 31 and must be renewed by Friday, Feb. 15, 2019, to avoid late fees.

All current business license holders will receive renewal packets in late December. Any business that does not receive its renewal packet by Dec. 31 should contact the Revenue Office to verify its mailing address and request another packet. The City Revenue Office is located in City Hall at 144 Tichenor Ave. Business hours are Monday-Friday, 8 a.m.-5 p.m. except City holidays. Water services rate to increase in January

On Oct. 18, 2018, Auburn Water Works Board approved a slight rate increase for water services effective for bills sent to customers beginning in January 2019. For most residential customers (¾" meters), the change is as follows:

Per 1K Gals Current Rate Rate Eff. Jan. 1, 2019 Increase per 1K Gals

First 3K gals	\$4.86	\$5.25	\$0.39
Over 3K gals	\$3.86	\$4.17	\$0.31

The average residential water usage is 5,000 gallons per month. The charge for water on the average bill will increase from \$22.30 to \$24.09, an increase of \$1.79. Northwest Auburn Neighborhood Plan receives award



The City of Auburn Planning Department has been awarded the Outstanding Planning Award for a Plan or Planning Program for the Northwest

Auburn Neighborhood Plan by the Alabama Chapter of the American Planning Association. The City was recognized for this achievement at the State Chapter's 2018 Annual Conference on Oct. 11 in Oxford, Mississippi. The newest member of the Planning Department staff, Jay Howell, also received the Distinguished Leadership Award for a Planning Student at the conference, having been nominated by the Planning Program faculty at Auburn University.

This is the fifth major award the Planning Department has received in the last 10 years and is a testament to the thorough and persistent work of Planning Department staff members. The department collaborated with area residents, business owners and organizations to develop a plan that fits the needs of the community and provides a clear roadmap for revitalization.

Recycling tips for the holiday season

As you clean up after this holiday season, keep in mind the many ways the City of Auburn can help you make less of an impact on our environment.

- 1) Recycling your Christmas tree is as easy as placing it at the curb. The City of Auburn Environmental Services Department will collect and recycle Christmas trees during customers' weekly curbside collections.
- 2) Don't forget to recycle the boxes from your gifts this holiday season. Cardboard boxes and gift boxes are included in our curbside recycling program and may be recycled at the Recycling Drop-Off Center at 365-A N. Donahue Drive. Please break down all boxes before placing them for recycling.
- 3) Before frying or baking those hams and turkeys this season, pick up a free container from the Recycling Drop-Off Center to recycle the used cooking oil rather than pouring it down the drain. Though it may seem harmless, letting grease and cooking oil run down the drain is the main cause of sewer back-ups. Instead, simply pour any used, cooled cooking oil into a leak-proof container and bring it to the Drop-off Center or place it by the curb for recycling. Alfred J. Davis, Sr. leads new Community Services Department



In July, Alfred J. Davis, Sr. was appointed as the City of Auburn's first Community Services director. Though he is new to the position, Davis isn't new to the City or its community development efforts.

Davis returned to the City after a substantial career in local government and economic development that

has its roots in Auburn. Davis became acquainted with the City's operations during his time as a master's student in political science at Auburn University. He interned with the City and completed his thesis on Auburn's wastewater treatment systems. During his last summer at Auburn University, he interned with the Environmental Protection Agency in Washington D.C. and accepted a position as a program analyst with the EPA after graduation.

A year later in 1987, Davis returned to Alabama when he accepted an opportunity to become the City of Auburn's first assistant to the Public Safety director. Soon after, he transferred to the City's Economic Development Department as a community development officer where he managed the City's Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program. Four years later, he became the City's first Environmental Services director. After 12 years of building the new department, Davis moved to North Carolina to become the City of Durham's Solid Waste Management director.

Davis became the City of Tuskegee's first city manager following the city's transition to a council-manager form of government in 2005. He went on to serve as the executive director of Central Alabamaworks in 2013. He became the director of workforce development for

Southern Union in 2017 and served there until returning to the City in July.

"I wouldn't have left Southern Union for any other reason," Davis said of his opportunity to return to the City. "We've always had a strong council here, but in addition to that, we've always had an excellent management team. Very professional, very skilled and it's unique. I've been in a number of organizations that had good people, but this one is clearly outstanding in terms of its management team."

As Community Services director, Davis is responsible for the operation of the City's CDBG program, including housing rehabilitation, construction of new affordable housing, reconstructing substandard houses and demolishing dilapidated structures. Davis also administers the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's (HUD) Section 108 Loan Guarantee Program, micro-loans and manages the Minority Business Enterprise and Women's Business Enterprise activities.

Previously a division within the Economic Development Department, Auburn's City Manager created the Community Services Department in early 2018 to help enhance the City's neighborhood development and improvement program and further the impact of the CDBG program.

"Our work is a critical part of what the City of Auburn does," Davis said. "What we do directly impacts people's daily lives. By Community Services having its own identity and place, we're able to put that much more focus on what we do and the services we provide."

Along with the organizational move, Community Services relocated to and now manages the Boykin Community Center at 400 Boykin St. With the new fitness center and the upcoming addition of Auburn University Health Care Clinic and Education Center, the center is transforming from a recreation center into a true community center with a variety of resources for residents of Auburn.

Moving forward, the department will be a vital part in implementing the Northwest Auburn Neighborhood Plan and overseeing the second phase of renovations to the Boykin Community Center in addition to its annual CDBG duties. In 2019, Davis and his team plan to engage residents in a community-wide dialogue to identify housing and community development priorities and HUD funding priorities.
