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
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MONEY names Auburn best place to live in Alabama

Recycling in Auburn

Single-Stream

The single-stream recycling rollout is almost complete! Since December, Environmental Services has worked to distribute 7,000 new blue bins to the rest of Auburn residents who were interested in participating in the single-stream recycling program. All carts should be distributed by the end of January, weather permitting.

Whether you're new to the area, new to recycling or a recycling pro, here are some tips to make sure your recyclables are repurposed and not left at the landfill. Only the following materials can be accepted in the City of Auburn's single-stream curbside recycling program:

- Plastics #1-#7. This includes things like plastic bottles and food containers. No plastic bags or toys are accepted.
- Aluminum, steel/tin cans. Please remember to rinse out your cans before placing them in bins.
- · All types of paper.
- Flattened cardboard, no larger than 4 by 2 feet.

Remember that things like glass and Styrofoam DO NOT belong in single-stream recycling carts. These materials break easily and contaminate the rest of the materials in a load, which means the entire contaminated portion ends up at the landfill rather than the recycling facility. All types of glass are still accepted at the Recycling Drop-Off Center at 365-A North Donahue Drive, so help us out by bringing your glass there instead of tossing it in your cart.

When you place your cart out for pickup, please remember to place it at least 3 feet from the curb, garbage carts, mailboxes, vehicles and any other nearby obstacles.

Recycling Drop-Off Center

Did you know that you can recycle 24 hours a day, year round in Auburn? The Recycling Drop-Off Center at 365-A North Donahue Drive was created in 1999 for just that.

While our single-stream curbside recycling program is limited to residential solid waste customers, the dropoff center is open to all Auburn residents. There, you'll find separate bins for everything that we accept in our single-stream curbside recycling program, including cans, flattened cardboard, paper, and plastics #1-7. You'll also find a place to recycle transistor batteries up to size D, cell phones, cooking grease and oil and glass.

Cold weather safety tips for pets



It's important to be aware of the risks that can come with colder temperatures to keep your pets safe! The City of Auburn Animal Control Division offers the following tips to keep your pet healthy and comfortable in colder weather:

Provide Shelter: A well-constructed dog house insulated with clean, dry bedding, such as straw, wood shavings or a blanket, will help keep your dog warm. Face the dog house opening away from the direction that the wind normally blows to help hold in warmth and prevent rain from blowing in. It's also a good idea to add a weatherresistant door flap. A flap can be purchased or, in a pinch, a heavy duty fabric, old vehicle mud flap or a piece of linoleum flooring will do.

Water: Make sure your pet always has access to fresh, clean water. Proper hydration is important to help your dog stay warm. It's also important to check water bowls often to make sure the water doesn't freeze over. To prevent lightweight bowls from tipping over, you can secure a bucket to a post or a tree, place the bucket inside of an old tire or dig a hole in the ground and place the bucket inside of it.

Food: Monitor your pet's diet. Animals may expend more calories in colder months than warmer times of year to keep warm. You may need to increase your pet's daily amount of food to compensate.

Cold Sensitive Pets: Remember that colder temperatures may be harder on some pets than others. Short hair breeds, smaller breeds and dogs that are young or old are more susceptible to the cold and should be closely monitored while outdoors. If your dog is sensitive to the cold because of age, illness or breed type, winter care accommodations should be adjusted accordingly.

Hypothermia: Know the warning signs! Hypothermia is a potentially deadly condition where the body temperature falls below normal. Signs include shivering, lethargy and lack of coordination. If you notice any of these symptoms, immediately move the animal to a warm location and wrap it in a blanket. Contact a veterinarian while warming your pet.

If you notice a pet that you are concerned about, document what you see including the date, time, exact location, type of animal and as many other details as possible. Then contact the City of Auburn Animal Control Division at (334) 501-3090. After hours, please contact the Auburn Police Division at (334) 501-3100.

Renew your business license by February

Any business providing services or selling goods within Auburn city limits, including a home-based business, is required to have a City of Auburn business license. City business licenses for 2018 expired on Dec. 31 and must be renewed by Friday, Feb. 15, 2019, to avoid late fees.

All current business license holders should have received renewal packets in late December. Any business that did not receive its renewal packet by Dec. 31 should contact the Revenue Office to verify its mailing address and request another packet. The City Revenue Office is located in City Hall at 144 Tichenor Ave. Business hours are Monday-Friday, 8 a.m.-5 p.m. except City holidays. HOW MANY ROOMMATES MAY I HAVE?

Certain areas of Auburn, or zoning districts, limit the number of unrelated people at an address to help reduce overcrowding and preserve neighborhood character.

There are three zoning districts in Auburn which limit to two the number of unrelated occupants living in a dwelling in those zones. Those districts are Neighborhood Conservation (NC), Limited Development District (LDD) and Development District Housing (DDH).
