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21st Annual Mayor's Memorial Day Breakfast

Auburn Mayor Ron Anders and the Auburn Veterans Committee invite you to join us at the 21st Annual Mayor's Memorial Day Breakfast on Monday, May 27, as we honor the U.S. Military and those who have made the ultimate sacrifice.

This year's event will begin at 8 a.m. at the Hotel at Auburn University and Dixon Conference Center. The Auburn University Naval ROTC will present the colors, and the



Providence Singers—directed by Dr. Tom Smith, former head of the Auburn University Music Department and founder of the AU Singers—will perform the National Anthem and the Medley of Service Songs.

Retired Sgt. Buck Marsh will be the guest of honor and the recipient of the 2019 Distinguished Veteran Award. For the eighth year, the Auburn Heroes Remembered Award will be presented to the family of a local distinguished veteran who has passed away. This year's award will be in honor of Lt. Col. Ted Sargent, U.S. Marine Corps and posthumous recipient of the Navy Cross for his service in Vietnam.

A memorial wreath laying ceremony will follow the breakfast and award presentations at 10 a.m. at the Auburn Veterans Memorial Monument, located at the northeast corner of Ross Street and Glenn Avenue. Kristen Reeder appointed new HR director



After six years with the City of Auburn, Senior Human Resources Generalist Kristen Reeder began her new role as Human Resources director on April 1. Reeder was selected to take the place of retiring Director Steve Reeves, who served as the director since 1993.

Reeder is an Auburn High School graduate with a bachelor's in human

resource management from Capella University and a master's in management, strategy and leadership from Michigan State University. Having spent most of her life in Auburn, she is looking forward to furthering her service to the community she loves.

"I am so fortunate to be able to take over a department that has a great reputation and is often looked at as a model human resources department," Reeder said. "The work Steve Reeves has done over the past 25-plus years as human resources director to establish this department gives me an amazing foundation to work from."

Reeder has 19 years' worth of experience in human resources. She started her career in 2000 as an operations manager for Cleveland Brothers, Inc. in Auburn. Three years later, her family moved to Atlanta where she served as the human resources/payroll coordinator at Pine State Mortgage. Reeder was promoted to director of human resources after a year, implementing organizational design and staffing changes to accommodate for changes in the company's workforce, among other duties. After six years, Reeder became the human resources manager for The Schenck School in Atlanta where she served for three years before returning to Auburn.

Reeder began her career with the City of Auburn in 2013. Her responsibilities have covered the gamut of human resources work, from making sure employees receive equitable pay and managing the recruitment process to creating monthly employee newsletters and developing employee training programs.

"Kristen has a track record of excellence in all of her efforts, and I'm excited to add her to the City's management team," said City Manager James Buston. "The role of human resources director is an important one, often working behind the scenes to make sure every employee provides excellent customer service to Auburn's residents. I am confident that Kristen has the skills and experience needed to lead this department's efforts to even further success."

During her time with the City, Reeder considers one of

her greatest achievements to be the creation of the City of Auburn Academy, a program that allows employees to get a glimpse into the day-to-day work of other departments. The year-long program is now in its fifth year.

"One of my favorite things about the program is watching the passion employees have for their work," Reeder said. She remembered a maintenance worker who "lit up" when he explained his job to fellow employees, enthusiastically detailing his duties and coming out of his shell.

Moving forward, Reeder plans to build on the foundation set by Reeves' 25 years of service and to keep the department prepared for the changes and challenges of the future.

"Kristen has worked very hard to prepare herself for this opportunity," Reeves said. "She brings a great deal of knowledge, experience, energy and enthusiasm to her new role in Human Resources. Kristen is a member of an exceptional team, and they will continue to support ethical and effective public service to the Auburn community. I am very proud of Kristen, and I know she will provide good leadership."

Travel(ing) with Care after dark



Did you know that a pedestrian was killed every 1.5 hours in the U.S. in 2017, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration? The majority of these deaths occurred at night. Here in we're Auburn, constantly improving sidewalks,

crosswalks and streets to make traveling at night safer for everyone, but pedestrians and bicyclists can play a vital part in staying safe by making sure they're visible to motorists after the sun goes down.

Don't ever assume that a driver can see you—studies have shown that pedestrians wearing dark clothing are first visible to drivers at 55 feet away, yet a car traveling 25 mph requires 155 feet to stop. In fact, it's illegal in Auburn to travel by foot after sunset without making yourself visible to vehicles from a minimum of 500 feet whether you're exercising or just walking from point A to point B.

Wearing reflective gear is the first step to making sure motorists can still spot you when the sun goes down. In Auburn, you're required to wear reflective material between your waist and shoulders during "hours of darkness," or between half an hour before sunset to half an hour before sunrise. Reflectors allow motorists to spot you from 500 feet away, giving them a 10-second

cushion to slow down and safely navigate around you. You can also:

- Wear bright colors. Pedestrians and cyclists who wear brightly colored clothing enhance their visibility even more from dusk to dawn.
- Carry a flashlight or make sure you have headlights. Bicyclists must have an operating headlight on the front of their helmet and red reflectors on the front and rear spokes of both wheels and pedals. An additional red reflector on the rear of a bike is also required by state law.
- Keep alert at all times. Don't be distracted by electronic devices that take your eyes and ears off the road.
- Never assume a driver sees you. Make eye contact with drivers as they approach to make sure you are seen.
- Be proactive. If you are somewhere past nightfall and will be walking or biking home, always plan ahead.
 Pack light reflectors in a bag so you will be prepared to safely make your way home.
