

Auburn FixIt: an easier way to reach your local government

We're excited to announce a new feature coming in late October that will make it even easier to access the City services you need! Auburn FixIt is a new app that allows you to interact directly with your local government. You can request City services and report non-emergency concerns directly to City staff and track an issue's progress from beginning to resolution. It's accessible, transparent and made with you in mind.

Auburn FixIt lets residents report issues directly from their smart devices using a mobile app or the City's website. See a pothole on Magnolia? Can't find Fluffy? Did we miss your recycling pickup? See an issue at one of our parks? No more digging through our website or figuring out which department to call—let us know using one app.

Welcoming new Environmental Services, Finance directors



Catrina Cook, Environmental Services

A lifelong Auburn resident, Cook began her career as an intern in the City's Environmental Services Department. Cook's interest in serving her hometown was sparked during a class at Auburn University taught by

former Auburn City Manager Doug Watson. As she began Auburn's graduate program in public administration, she took the first step in her now 21-year stint with the City by signing up to educate Auburn City Schools students about the City's recycling program.

A year later, she was promoted to the department's administrative assistant and realized the breadth of impact Environmental Services has. Through trash, garbage and recycling pickup for every household in the community, animal control and fleet maintenance, Cook was able to help serve Auburn residents and support other City departments.

"It's not just the citizens that we serve on a weekly basis, but we also impact other departments—it is public service at its best," Cook said.

In 1999, Cook took on the role of Right of Way Maintenance Division manager, coordinating daily schedules for keeping the City's streets, sidewalks and easements looking their best.

"That, to me, was an area that impacts everyone, even those that visited and business that came to town," Cook said, remembering coordinating with the City's Economic Development Department when industries would visit Auburn. "I saw it as an economic engine for the City."

For the last 15 years, Cook worked with former department heads to further the department's impact as the assistant director of Environmental Services. She helped connect departments through the Keep Auburn Beautiful program, an affiliate of Keep America Beautiful, and has played a key part in establishing the City's new single-stream recycling program. Cook has sought out professional development opportunities throughout her career, and in 2018 she received a certificate of completion for Senior Executives in State and Local Government from Harvard University's Kennedy School of Government Executive Education.

A few months into her new role, Cook is implementing a new fleet management solution that will allow the department to track City vehicles, monitor engine diagnostics and help optimize collection routes all to increase efficiencies and save taxpayer dollars.

Her mission, she says, is to take care of Auburn the best she can.

"Being able to make change in your hometown is big for me," Cook said. "Auburn is a beautiful place. We set high expectations for ourselves, and we want to make sure that our homeowners and citizens do too."



Allison Edge, Finance

With a penchant for numbers, a degree in business administration and some experience in banking and public accounting, Edge began her tenure with the City in 1999 as an accountant in the Finance Department. What she at first thought of as "just a job"

quickly became much more than that.

"After starting the job, I realized what it meant to serve the public," Edge said. "It didn't take long to understand how the work I did affected people's lives, and I knew I would be here for a long time."

Edge's sights were set on becoming Finance director, and she began making steps toward that goal. She earned her master of accountancy from Auburn University in 2005 and became a certified public accountant in 2007. She was promoted twice during this time, first to financial analyst in 2001 and then to principal financial analyst in 2005. Six years later, Edge became assistant director of the Finance Department.

In all of these roles, Edge has been part of a team that has received annual awards for the department's Comprehensive Annual Financial Report and the Government Finance Officers Association's Distinguished Budget Presentation Award.

"I often hear from other finance professionals around the state that are envious of the City of Auburn and its success," Edge said. "We have earned that reputation, and if that's not a top achievement, then nothing is."

Edge stepped into her new role as director in September 2019. One of her primary goals moving forward is to continue striving for excellence in customer service for both internal and external customers. Technological improvements are in the works to offer additional options online and to make all customers' lives easier. Overall, Edge plans to continue leading the department to fulfill the City's mission.

"Every single point included in the City's mission statement involves work that the Finance Department does each day," Edge said. "From every check we write to every accounting entry we process to every tax or utility payment we receive, we are improving the quality of life for the citizens."
