June 2014 Council to Consider Next Biennial Budget in June

In June the Auburn City Council will consider the City's next biennial budget, covering fiscal years 2015 and 2016. Current budgeting challenges for policy makers include balancing the needs of Auburn City Schools in the face of rapid enrollment growth with the need to maintain city services at the level that citizens expect and demand.

To meet these challenges, the City of Auburn will continue budgeting practices begun in 2006, and intensified when it became apparent that the national economy was headed into deep recession. Those cost-cutting measures have included holding operating costs level and evaluating all job vacancies before replacements are hired. Additionally, city employees have not received cost-of-living adjustments in five years. The City has long operated on a lean personnel budget, currently spending 40.5% of the General Fund on personnel costs, while most cities operate at well over 60%. The City has also aggressively pursued grant funding, and the award of almost \$11 million in ATRIP funds over the past two years has provided for more infrastructure projects to be accomplished with less local funding. The City's Five-Mill fund has also absorbed the cost of some infrastructure and facility projects, from street-resurfacing to the recent downtown parking project.

The Auburn City Council has long made school funding a top priority, with the City providing \$123.8 million from the City's general fund to Auburn City Schools in the past 28 years. The exceptional quality of local schools is demonstrated in the caliber of students, teachers and staff, as well as through the recognitions and awards the school system receives. The quality of local schools also influences the quality of life in Auburn, from property values to our reputation as a friendly and safe community. Rapid enrollment growth has led to the need for increased school funding and additional facilities. The City of Auburn does not have the financial resources to fully meet those needs, but the budget controls listed above coupled with reductions in planned and scheduled capital projects will allow the City to provide increased funding for the schools. As this issue of Open Line hits mailboxes, city management is finalizing a budget proposal to the Council to balance increased funding for schools with provision of necessary city services. Details of the plan will become available as the City Council considers the City's next budget in public meetings.

Auburn citizens have made it clear through both the Annual Citizen Survey and through direct input to City Hall that, in addition to continued support for Auburn City Schools, traffic flow and congestion management and maintenance of city infrastructure should be top priorities. Residents have also said they want a better Opelika road, with a focus on redeveloping abandoned and underused properties.

Recent budgets have balanced all of these concerns. The last four biennial budgets have funded a total of \$61.9 million from the City's general fund to Auburn City Schools. In the same time, economic development recruitment projects have announced 3,400 jobs. When industries locate

in Auburn, school taxes are not abated so the taxes on any investment these industries make in Auburn goes directly to Auburn City Schools. The City has completed annual resurfacing projects to maintain Auburn's infrastructure and several major projects to improve traffic flow throughout Auburn including at Shug Jordan Parkway and Richland Road; Magnolia Avenue and Donahue Drive; Donahue Drive, Bragg Avenue and Martin Luther King, Junior Boulevard; and South College Street at East

University Drive among others.

Even during the depths of the recent recession, the City's quality of life, economy and financial management were recognized externally. The City's bond rating was upgraded from AA- to AA+ by S&P, and from Aa3 to Aa2 by Moody's. National media recognitions included Auburn being named a "Great Place to Live" by The Today Show, a top ten "Best Places to Live" by U.S. News and World Report, a "Best Small Place for Business and Careers," and a "Best Small City for Jobs," by Forbes Magazine.

The next budget will continue to find a fiscally responsible balance between the new level of funding needed for Auburn City Schools and the continued need for the city services citizens expect. Judge Joe Bailey

Political Sign Regulations Reminder

This year, Auburn citizens will vote in elections at the Federal, State and local level. On August 26th, municipal elections will be held for Mayor and City Council. With election year upon us, the City of Auburn would like to take a moment to remind citizens and candidates of regulations governing the placement of political signs in the City limits:

- Signs may not be placed earlier than 30 days prior to the election date. This includes signs for primary elections.
- Signs may not be placed in the public right of way, on any structures in the right of way (power poles, traffic signs, and medians), or on any property owned by the City of Auburn or Auburn City Schools.
- Signs are limited to a maximum size of 32 square feet.
- Signs must be removed within seven days following the election.

It is the responsibility of the candidate to ensure that volunteers who distribute and install political signs are in compliance with these regulations.
